Daulat Ram College

Daulat Ram College (DRC), University of Delhi is a premier educational institute for women founded by an educationist, late Shri Daulat Ram Gupta in 1960. Originally started as “Pramila College” at 22 Tilak Marg with 13 members of teaching staff and about 350 students, the college in 1964 shifted to its present premises in North Delhi University Campus and was re-named as “Daulat Ram College”. The institution since then has acquired a strong identity and has evolved into a prestigious women's college with its own distinct culture and traditions. It is engaged in imparting holistic and quality education at undergraduate level in all disciplines, Science, Commerce, and Humanities to about 3600 students via distinguished faculty. It is the only women's college in North campus, University of Delhi that offers Psychology (Hons) to students. It also enrolls students at the Masters level and holds M.A. tutorials. Besides, it offers add-on courses in foreign languages which are open to public. The college was accredited with 'A' Grade by National Assessment & Accreditation Council (NAAC) in April 2017. It was awarded Star status by Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Government of India (GOI) for undertaking innovative practices in science department.

The college has well-equipped laboratories, computer laboratories with internet facilities, besides Wi-Fi enabled lecture theatres/classrooms with LCD projectors. It also has a well-resourced Conference Hall. It has fully air-conditioned library with over 1,20,000 titles and numerous subscribed journals with computerized data base and access. The library also has two Braille computers and one Braille printer for the visually challenged students. Furthermore, the college is well-equipped in sports facilities.

The college not only excels in academics but has acquired a leading position in University of Delhi in different co-curricular activities such as debates, dramatics, music and dance, NSS, NCC and sports. It has various interest clubs, societies, Subject associations, which help in comprehensive development of the personality of our students. Every academic session college organises Conferences (National and International), Seminars, Workshops, Faculty Development Programmes, In-house Skill Development Programmes and talks on important issues/subjects that further helps in the growth of students. The highly qualified and experienced teaching faculty of the college is not just limited to class room teaching but also in taking up various prestigious research projects from organizations like DRDO, ICSSR, UGC, University of Delhi, etc. that provide students opportunities to gain additional experience.

The college has been awarded many research projects under Star Innovation Projects, Cluster Innovation Centre, University of Delhi. In addition the college has remarkable facilities such as Psychology Resource Centre, Drosophila Resource Centre and ZebraFish Lab facility. The college also has a well-maintained hostel facility extended to outstation students on the basis of merit.

Thus, the College provides a holistic experience to its students, by working on their intellectual, physical, emotional, ethical and moral development.

The Chairperson's Message



Daulat Ram College is a premium college for women in Delhi University, founded by the individualistic educationist, Late Shri Daulat Ram Gupta in 1960. The institute, a large constituent college of University of Delhi, originally started as 'Pramila College' and was renamed as Daulat Ram College in 1964 as it grew into a full-fledged extended college of University of Delhi. It imparts education at the Bachelors level in Arts, Science and Commerce. It also enrolls students at the Masters Level and holds M.A. Tutorials. At present the College has 18 departments, over 3546 students on rolls, 185 teaching staff and 71 non-teaching staff. The courses in Science were introduced in 1968 which led to the construction of the Science Block and Science laboratories. The Commerce and M.A. courses as well as new Courses in B.A. (Hons.) and B.A. Programme were added simultaneously. Further expansion occurred with the introduction of B.Sc. (Hons.) in Bio-Chemistry, Chemistry and addition of Nutrition and Health Education (NHE), and Mathematics (Hons.).

Foreign language as an add-on Course in the college is open to the public. It offers Certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma

courses in French/ German/ Spanish/ Italian/ Chinese/ Japanese and Korean languages. The College building also houses a block of tutorial rooms, an imposing seminar hall, Computer laboratories with internet facilities and a well-equipped library with around 1,20,000 titles. The college holds a leading position in sports and was developed as a training venue for the Commonwealth Games, 2010. It boasts of a State-de-arte multi-sports Academy and compendium of latest sports facilities. Co-curricular activities like Societies, Departmental Associations, the Women's Development Centre, Eco-Club, N.S.S and N.C.C. are available. For the old students to connect to their alma mater, the college has an active Alumni Association.

The college students' hostel has an intake capacity of nearly 204 students. The intensely cherished dream of the founder Shri Daulat Ram Gupta was finally given expression in 1990 by the then Chairperson late Shri Mahendra Nath Gupta (his son) who called upon Shri Rajiv Gandhi to lay the foundation stone of what stands today as an imposing multi-purpose auditorium in the frontage of the college. On the spur of the moment it was named 'Sadbhavana Bhawan'. From 1990 onwards, Shri Mahendra Nath Gupta relentlessly pursued its construction. In 1997, the 'Sadbhavana Bhawan' was inaugurated to articulate the talent and the creative genius of the students in Arts, Culture, Sports & Drama. It has a seating capacity of over 1400 persons.

The vibrant mix of the co-curricular and extracurricular activities both at the intra college and inter college levels adds to the multidimensional character of the college. I feel privileged to be the Chairperson of such an institution and carrying forward the vision of its founder Daulat Ram Gupta, as his descendant.

Message from Principal's Desk

Daulat Ram College, a star status and NAAC accredited 'A' grade college is a premier educational institution in Delhi. The College has all India ranking of 37 in National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) conducted by MHRD. The College which is located in the heart of University of Delhi's North Campus is known for its sound academic practices as well as vibrant extracurricular activities. This year College is offering nearly 1300 seats at the first year undergraduate level and in addition more than 200 supernumerary seats for Students falling under PwD, Sports, ECA, Children of War Widows, Kashmiri migrants and Sikkimese and other foreign nationals etc. Daulat Ram College (DRC) offers under graduate courses in 18 subjects in all three fields viz humanities, commerce and sciences and post graduate courses in seven humanities subjects. In addition, College has a Center for Foreign Languages where in certificate, diploma and advanced diploma is given in seven foreign languages viz. Japanese, Korean, Chinese, German, Spanish, French and Italian. Foreign students from different countries- Afghanistan, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Tibet, Uzbekistan, Mauritius, Bangladesh etc. are enrolled in the college.

The College has 188 teaching staff supported by equal number of non-teaching staff. The faculty is actively engaged in research and publications in addition to their regular teaching and evaluation work. Senior faculty members are also engaged in supervising Ph.D. students under them. In the last academic year more than 150 research articles were published by them. The College has Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which formulates the academic calendar and is responsible for monitoring the academic events. Approximately 92 eminent professors, scientists, Speakers, Judges, Administrators visited College in different programs during the year and enriched the students with their wisdom. College follows Choice Based Credit System wherein the best possible combinations are offered to students under generic electives, skill enhancement courses, and discipline specific elective courses which are detailed in following pages. College organizes extracurricular activities for students. The events like Miss DRC Talent Hunt, Manjari, Hostel Night, Sports Meet, societies like Annhad, Alahyaa, Zenith, Spectra, Sepia etc. provide platform where students can participate and showcase their talent. The Dance Society

'Anhad' brought laurels to College by securing top three positions at various inter-college competitions across various universities. The music society of DRC 'Ahalaya' is ranked the best society in Delhi University. The Debating Society' of the college was awarded, 'Best Debating Society award in DU circuit by Education tree. Self-Defense training camps and Yoga training camps are organized regularly for physical and mental well-being of students. The Equal Opportunity cell looks after the academic and extracurricular activities of the differently abled students. The College has a North East Cell which was established in 2014. The Cell has been active in sensitizing other students towards the culture and traditions of students belonging to North East. They have been working closely with local police and DCW for helping these students. The College has a recycling unit on campus which recycles the paper and other organic waste. The aim of this unit is to make campus Zero waste discharge Unit with active participation of students. Thus, students are trained to keep campus clean and green through three R's initiatives taken by Eco club Dhara, recycling unit, NSS and NCC. Students organize tree plantations drives and Swachata Abhiyan under various programs. College has NCC unit consisting of 165 cadets.

The college houses several summer programs such as in-house skill development programs, life skill programs and exchange programs. In the last session first INSPIRE (Innovation in Science, Pursuit of Inspired Research) Science camp, sponsored by Department of Science and Technology (DST), Government of India was organized from 17th-21st December, 2018. Around 150 students from various schools of Delhi NCR actively participated in the camp. Students are encouraged to join faculty to undertake research projects and convert their ideas into reality. Fourteen students of this College have been awarded University Meritorious Award 2018-19 by University of Delhi. In addition, College has instituted 101 proficiency prizes, 47 instituted prizes, 21 merit scholarship and 8 instituted scholarship for its meritorious students. College offers 100% scholarship to all its PwD including VH students. Poor and needy students are helped through student aid fund.

The Placement Cell of college is very active. Students of all discipline are encouraged to get themselves enrolled in the Placement Cell through their coordinators. Many companies have come to college for recruitment drive with profiles varying from Product Manager to Human Resource, from Research Analyst to Content writer. The profiles offered covered students from all courses and possessing diverse Skill set. The notable companies were Delloit,

GDS, KPMG India, Teach for India, NIIT, Trevista, Finedge, CVENT, Genpact, S & P Global, Elements HR Service Pvt Ltd etc. Nearly 300 students got Placement/internship in these companies. Many students are offered internships in various Govt and semi Govt organizations as well. Internship fair organized by Placement cell gives opportunity to thousands of students who are exposed to various career opportunities and openings/internships in industry. This year the Placement Cell also offered a wide range of internship opportunities with organizations like Hindustan Times, Zomato, Vivo India, ED Times, Urban Clap, Qversity, Mazars etc. There were over 45 companies which participated in the fair. The companies offering recruitment included Teach for India, Dhvani RIS, My First Boss, organizations offering internships included Outlook, Toplurn, Young Engine, IGIA, Lakshay Consultants, Atex Consulting Pvt. Ltd. A few not for profit organizations like Umeed, Sharp NGO, Feeding India also took part in the fair.

At Daulat Ram College, we believe in imparting holistic education in addition to formal education that we impart within existing University framework, we also engage our students in connecting themselves to grass root level. National Social Service (NSS) organized for its students Self Defence Workshop, Senior Citizen Day, National Unity Day, Swachta Pakhwada, Blood Donation Drive, Voters Forum Campaign. The students rendered their services in Youth for Seva movement, Bharat Uday Abhiyan, plantation drive. The members of Women Development Cell (WDC) of our college have been visiting PALNA orphanage and the volunteers have been devoting regular hours, visiting and teaching children ranging from Pre-Nursery to class VIII.

College boasts of well-stacked library including braille library, the science laboratories & their museums, computer labs, state of art Gymnasium, Conference Halls, amphitheatre etc. The entire campus is Wi-fi enabled and under CCTV. Our commitment is to provide a safe, positive and intellectual learning environment that will empower students to become creative problem solvers, thinkers and inspired learners prepared to embark in the twenty-first century. This booklet provides information that is key to your successful navigation of the Undergraduate program you have chosen. We want you to thrive and succeed here, academically, socially and personally.

Admission Process

- i. Applicants who have applied on university portal and meet the requisite cut-off should login to the UG admission portal through their registration account and select college/course where the applicant wishes to take admission.
- ii. A clear copy of online admission form containing the name of college (Daulat Ram College) with photograph should be printed on A4 size good quality paper. The candidate should bring photographs (2 copies) along with all relevant documents in original to college for verification of documents and other eligibility criterion.
- iii. The applicant should present the documents in the college and produce their originals for verification, after which the Principal of the college will approve the admission. In case all documents cannot be verified online, the College will give provisional admission. Admitted provisional students have to produce the originals of the required mandatory documents to the College within a week after the last day of UG Admissions for forensic verification, failing which the admission of the said provisional student may be cancelled by the College.
- iv. All colleges shall admit all applicants who meet the announced cut-off criteria. There will not be any first come first serve policy. Late arrivals outside of the prescribed duration of each cut-off will not be entertained. Eligible Applicants of the (n-1)th Cut-Off List, if any, shall be entertained for admissions only in the last hour of the third day of current nth Cut-Off subject to the availability of vacant seats.
- v. The college will retain the certificates of approved applicant. The certificates will remain with the colleges during the admission process. However, the colleges shall promptly return the documents in case student withdraws/cancels the admission or student wishes to appear in counselling of any other university/ institute for which a written application is to be given to S.O. (Administration).
- vi. The applicant will receive a link on their online portal to pay the fee, which can only be paid online through the portal. The applicant is advised to pay the fee without delay within 24 hrs after the approval of admission by the Head of Institution and save the acknowledgement slip bearing transaction ID, Credit Card/ Debit card/ Net banking details and date of transaction as a proof for future reference. On successful payment of fees, the applicant is granted provisional admission to the said college.
- vii. It may be noted that the admission in a college is completed only after payment of the online admission fee on the UG admission portal within the prescribed time-limit.
- viii. An applicant can take admission only in one course in one college at any given time. In case a student wishes to withdraw/cancel the admission in a course/college, the applicant should approach the college where the admission is taken. Only after the college cancels the admission of an applicant, the candidate can proceed to take admission in other courses/colleges. Applicants are advised to exercise extreme care to ensure that they meet the requirements for the college/course before cancelling their previous admission. Admission fee will be transferred to other college where students takes admission with a deduction of Rs. 1000/- as per university rules.
- ix. When the applicant pays the admission fee, through the Dashboard after the admission is approved, the admission fee will be adjusted automatically and the applicant will have to pay only the balance fee if it is more than the fees already paid at the previous college. If the fee in the latter college is less, the balance will be refunded to the applicant's account or to an account declared by the applicant as per the College/University rules after the admissions are closed.

- x Refund of fees due to cancellation or any other reasons WILL NOT BE DONE AFTER THE LAST DAY OF UNDERGRADUATE ADMISSIONS, 2019-20.
- xi. Only one cancellation is allowed per Cut-off List. The number of cancellations will be restricted to $(n-1)$, where n is the total number of Cut-off Lists.

In case of any ambiguity the information uploaded on University of Delhi's official website www.du.ac.in would be treated as final and binding on all.

Relaxations in Course-specific Eligibility Criteria

- To determine their eligibility and merit, applicants from the SC/ST categories shall be given a relaxation to the extent of 5% in the respective eligibility criteria and merit for admission prescribed for applicants from the UR category. If, after giving 5% relaxation, these reserved seats still remain vacant, further relaxation would be given to the extent required in order to fill all the reserved seats in the course concerned. Eligibility in such cases is pass percentage.
- To determine the eligibility and merit, applicants from the OBC category shall be given a relaxation in the respective eligibility in the qualifying examination to the extent of 10% of the eligibility marks prescribed for applicants from the UR Category. For example, if the minimum eligibility for admission to a course is 50% for the UR Category applicants, the minimum eligibility for the OBC category will be 45% (i.e. 50% minus 10% of 50%).
- Applicants from the PwD category shall be given a relaxation in the respective eligibility for the course concerned in the qualifying examination to the extent of 5%.
- Applicants from the CW category shall be given a relaxation of 5% in the respective eligibility for the course concerned in the qualifying examination.
- Eligibility Criteria for merit-based admissions under the EWS category shall be identical to that of UR category.

Special Instructions for Boards other than CBSE

1. If a paper's title does not match with what is specified in List A and List B above, it is mandatory for the applicant to provide a content equivalence certificate from the Principal/Head of the Institution last attended, certifying that the paper's content is equivalent to NCERT Class XII syllabus for that paper. This equivalence certificate must be accompanied by a copy of the syllabus of the paper attested by the Principal/Head of the Institution. However, the University of Delhi's decision on the matter will be final and binding.
2. If the applicant has studied "Botany" and "Zoology" separately, the total of marks in both these papers must be entered in the respective fields for theory and practicals under the heading "Biology" in the field provided in his/her admission form.

3. If the applicant's mark sheets contain both Class XI and XII marks, the applicant must enter **only the Class XII marks** in the respective fields provided in the admission forms.
4. Applicants should have passed theory and practical separately. Any paper with both theory and practical component will be considered only in the ratio **70 (theory) : 30 (practical)** if the theory component of the paper is less than 70%. The applicant should separately fill into the online Admission Form the marks obtained and maximum marks for theory and practical each, and the totals, as per their marksheet. In case the **theory/practical breakup is not specified**, the applicant will be required to enter 0 (zero) in the concerned theory/practical fields, and enter only the total in the online Admission Form.
5. **Internal Assessment** marks mentioned in the marksheet will not be used for any calculations.
6. Any discrepancy in the entry of marks pertaining to theory, practicals or totals will be the sole responsibility of the applicant. The application form may be summarily rejected.

Reservations and Relaxations

The merit list for the unreserved category (UR) seats will comprise all the applicants in order of merit. No one will be excluded from the same. In other words, the merit list will also include SC/ST/OBC/EWS applicants, irrespective of category, if they meet the criterion of merit for UR category. No applicant can be excluded from the UR category merit list just because the applicant belongs to or has applied under SC/ST/OBC/EWS category. Such an applicant is entitled to be considered under the UR category, as well as under the reserved category. Admission to UR category seats will be strictly in order of merit without excluding SC/ST/OBC/EWS applicants. Discrimination on the basis of category/caste is completely unlawful. Strict action will be taken against any violations. Applicants seeking admission under SC/ST/OBC/EWS category will have to produce for verification certificates in their own names.

Reservation of Seats for Scheduled Caste (SC)/ Scheduled Tribes (ST) Applicants

- 22½ % of the total numbers of seats is reserved for applicants belonging to SC and ST (15% for SC and 7½% for ST, interchangeable if necessary).
- It is a statutory obligation on the part of Colleges to fill all seats reserved for SC / ST applicants.
- Colleges shall not refuse admission to any SC/ST applicant on the basis of medium of instruction. Any deficiency in the knowledge of any particular language should be addressed; for this purpose remedial classes may be arranged by the College by utilizing grants available from University Grants Commission.
- Relaxation to the extent of 5% in the minimum marks shall be given to the applicants belonging to SC and ST to determine their eligibility and merit for admission to the course concerned.
- In case, after giving 5% relaxation, the reserved seats still remain vacant, further relaxation would be given to the extent required in order to fill all the reserved seats. (AC Resolution A88,

14.6.1983) (EC Resolution 157, 24.12.2001). It is obligatory for all Colleges/Departments to fill all the seats reserved for SC/ST applicants. Eligibility in these cases is pass percentage.

The following are empowered to issue the requisite SC/ST certificate:

- (a) District Magistrate/Additional District Magistrate/Collector/Deputy Commissioner/ Addl. Deputy Commissioner/Deputy Collector/1st class Stipendiary Magistrate/City Magistrate/Sub-Divisional Magistrate/Taluka Magistrate/Executive Magistrate/Extra Assistant Commissioner.
- (b) Chief Presidency Magistrate/ Addl. Chief Presidency Magistrate/Presidency Magistrate.
- (c) Revenue Officer not below the rank of Tehsildar.
- (d) Sub- Divisional Officer of the area where the Applicant and/ or his family normally resides.
- (e) Administrator /Secretary to the Administrator/Development Officer (Lakshadweep Islands).

The applicant must note that the SC/ST Certificate **from any other person/authority shall not be accepted in any case. If the applicant happens to belong to SC or ST, applicant's caste/tribe must be listed in the appropriate Govt. of India Schedule.**

The Caste Certificate should clearly state: (a) Name of his/ her caste/ tribe (b) whether applicant belongs to SC or ST (c) District and the State or Union Territory of applicant's usual place of residence, and (d) the appropriate Govt. of India Schedule under which his/ her caste/ tribe is approved as SC or ST.

If the applicant does not have their SC or ST caste/tribe certificate at the time of registration/applying, they may upload the acknowledgement slip of the SC or ST caste/tribe certificate application. However, at the time of admission, the applicant will have to produce the valid original SC or ST caste/tribe certificate.

However, if an SC/ST Applicant seeks admission under some other category (for example: PwD/Employee Ward, etc.) the applicant should satisfy the minimum eligibility requirement for that particular category.

Note: SC/ST applicants who get admission under open merit (unreserved) shall not be included in the reserved quota, i.e. 22.5% (15% for SC and 7.5% for ST).

It is obligatory for all Colleges/ Departments to fill all the seats reserved for SC/ST applicants. Minimum Eligibility in these cases is pass percentage.

Reservation of Seats for Other Backward Classes (OBC, Non-Creamy Layer, Central List)

- 27% seats will be reserved for the applicants belonging to Other Backward Classes (OBC) (non-creamy layer, central list).
- At the time of giving admission to an OBC applicant, the College will ensure that the caste is included in the Central List of OBC (the OBC status is to be determined on the basis of the Central (Govt. of India) List of OBCs notified by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment on the recommendations of the National Commission for Backward Classes available at the website <http://ncbc.nic.in/backwardclasses/index.html>.)
- The certificate must mention non-creamy layer status of the applicant (Non-creamy layer status issued by an authority mentioned in DOPT Office Memorandum no. 36012/22/93-Estt. (SCT) dated 15.11.1993).

- The OBC applicants who belong to the 'Non-Creamy Layer' and whose caste appears in the Central List of the OBCs only, shall be eligible to be considered for admission under the OBC category (Validity period of OBC certificate in respect of 'non-creamy layer' status of the applicants as per DOPT Office Memorandum No. 36036/2/2013-Estt. (Res-I) dated 31 March 2016). The validity of the non-creamy layer certificate shall be for the financial year 2018-2019, issued after 31st March, 2019.
- If the applicant does not have the OBC non-creamy layer certificate of the latest financial year 2018-2019 at the time of registration, the applicant may upload the previously issued (older) OBC non-creamy layer certificate or the acknowledgement slip of OBC non-creamy layer certificate application. However, at the time of admission, the applicant must produce the recent financial year's (2018-19) OBC non-creamy layer certificate, issued by the same competent authority. This additional certificate must have reference of applicant's already issued original caste certificate.
- The OBC applicants shall be given a relaxation of 10% in the minimum eligibility marks of the said course and for the admission entrance test a relaxation of 10% of the minimum eligibility marks prescribed for General/UR Category applicants.
- It is a statutory obligation on the part of Colleges to fill all the seats reserved for OBC applicants.

Reservation of Seats for Economically Weaker Section (EWS)

As per the University of Delhi notifications, Reference No. Aca. I / Reservation of EWSs / 2019 / 63 Dated 28th March 2019 and Reference No. Aca. I / Reservation of EWSs / 2019 / 101 Dated 15th May 2019, for the reservation for Economically Weaker Sections (EWSs) Category, the University Departments / Centres / Colleges have reserved 10% seats for admission for the same from this Academic Year, 2019-20. The eligibility of such applicants will be decided on the basis of fulfilling criteria prescribed in the above notifications, and subject to submission of documents, issued by the competent authority. The issuing authority for EWS certificate is the same as for SC/ST.

Reservation of Seats for Persons with Disabilities (PwD)

As per the provisions of Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016, not less than five percent (5%) seats are reserved for Persons with Benchmark Disabilities. Person with benchmark disability means a person with not less than forty percent (40%) of a specified disability where specified disability has not been defined in measurable terms and includes a person with disability where specified disability has been defined in measurable terms, as certified by the certifying authority. It may be noted that the erstwhile Persons with Disability Act, 1995, under which reservation for Persons with Disabilities in admissions was provided earlier has now been repealed.

PwD applicants shall be given a relaxation in the course-specific eligibility in the qualifying examination and in the admission entrance test to the extent of 5%, till seats are filled.

Concessional/Waiver of fees in respect of Persons with Disabilities (PwD)

Consequent upon amendment to Ordinance X(4) of the University, the following provision has been added after Sub-clause 2 of Ordinance X(4) of the said Ordinance:

- a. "Provided that the Persons with Physical Disabilities **shall be waived off all the fees payable** including the Examination fee and other University fees, except Admission fee, subscription towards Delhi University Students' Union and Identity Card fee for pursuing under-graduate, post-graduate or other courses in the University or its Colleges".
- b. In pursuance of the above, the applicants with physical disabilities pursuing various courses of study in the Faculties, Departments, Centres, and Institutions / Colleges of the University shall be **exempted from payment of fees, including examination fee and other University fees**, except Admission fee, subscription towards Delhi University students' Union and Identity Card fee.
- c. PwD applicants who will meet the cut-off for the unreserved category and will take admission in the unreserved category (UR) will pay the fee relevant for PwD applicant.
- d. In pursuance of the Executive Council Resolution No. 50 dated 03.11.2012, it is notified that the students with physical disabilities residing in different Hostels/Halls of the University are **exempted from payment of all hostel fees and charges** except refundable caution fee and the mess fees. The persons with Physical Disabilities shall pay **50% of the Mess fee** and the remaining 50% of the Mess Fee-in respect of the PwD students is being met by the University of Delhi. **Similar norms are to be adopted by the Colleges in respect of PwD Students residing in various hostels of the Colleges.**
- e. PwD students who are getting fellowships/financial assistance shall be exempted from payment of fees/charges/mess fees subject to the following conditions. **All admitted SC/ST, OBC, EWS, PwD students in colleges who are eligible for fellowships should submit their scholarship forms to the requisite office by February for timely processing.**

Reservation for Children/Widows of Personnel of the Armed Forces (CW)

- Five percent (5%) of seats are reserved for applicants under this category, course-wise in all colleges.
- All such applicants have to upload the Educational Concession certificate in the enclosed format sample to be issued by any of the following authorities on the proper letterhead:
 - (a) Secretary, Kendriya Sainik Board, Delhi.
 - (b) Secretary, Rajya Zila Sainik Board.
 - (c) Officer-in-Charge, Record Office.
 - (d) 1st Class Stipendiary Magistrate.

(e) Ministry of Home Affairs (For Police Personnel in receipt of Gallantry Awards).

(For further details please see Delhi University Admission Portal)

Reservation of Kashmiri Migrants (KM) (Supernumerary Seats)

- All the Wards (sons/ daughters) of Kashmiri Migrants who wish to be considered for admission to various undergraduate Programmes for University have to register online as per schedule notified by the University.
- Up to 5% seats are reserved programme-wise in all colleges for the wards of Kashmiri Migrants.
- All the Wards of Kashmiri Migrants will have to upload a certificate of registration as Kashmiri Migrants issued by Divisional Commissioner/ Relief Commissioner.
- Admission of Wards of Kashmiri Migrants will be based on cut-offs to be announced by the Colleges. A concession of maximum 10% in the last cut-off marks fixed for unreserved category applicants shall be extended to the Kashmiri Migrants.
- Reservation under this category is not available in courses where admission is based on entrance tests.

Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme for J&K students

The applicants selected under Prime Minister's special scholarship scheme for J&K students will be admitted directly to the Colleges. Reservation under this category is not available in courses where admission is based on entrance tests.

Note: For further details refer to University information bulletin.

Nomination of Seats for Sikkimese Students

Sikkimese students nominated by the Govt. of Sikkim shall be considered for admission by the University in Colleges where hostel facilities are available (AC Resolutions 51 dated 05/06/1980 and 122 dated 17/12/1990). The allocation of Sikkimese students for admission as well as for hostel accommodation in respective colleges be made by the Vice-Chancellor at his discretion. Reservation under this category is not available in courses where admission is based on entrance tests.

Seats for Ward Quota

Admission to the wards of University and College permanent in-service employees, both teaching and non-teaching, to the various undergraduate courses, excluding professional courses and other courses where admission is made on the basis of entrance test, is made according to the following criteria:

1. Admission to wards (children) of the permanent in-service employees at the college where employees are working be given on the basis of merit among such applicants subject to ordinarily one seat for every unit of up to sixty students in a course and subject to fulfilment of course-specific eligibility conditions.

2. For admission of the wards (sons/daughters) of the permanent in-service employees of the University/other colleges (teaching/non-teaching) the total number of seats for admission will not exceed six (three for the teaching and three for the non-teaching employees) on the basis of merit among such applicants subject to a maximum of ordinarily one seat for every unit of up to sixty students in a course and subject to fulfilment of course-specific eligibility conditions.
3. The admissions on the above norms will be against seats over and above the normal strength.
4. Applicants who wish to apply for admission under ward quota must fill the online registration form. They need to choose the colleges from the list for which they wish to apply at the time of registration. The schedule and process for admission under Ward Quota will be notified on the University website.

Extracurricular and Sports Quota (Supernumerary Seats)

It is mandatory for Colleges to provide sports facilities and encourage all students to participate in sports and extracurricular activities by introducing inter-class competitions and mass sports. Representation of at least 1% each (of total intake capacity of the college) of ECA and Sports is mandatory for all colleges, subject to a ceiling of 5% (of total intake capacity of the college) in total for ECA and Sports together. The actual number of seats to be filled on ECA and sports basis is decided keeping in view the facilities available, requirements of the Colleges and other relevant factors. Additional information regarding schedule (including preliminary and final trials) and availability of seats will be notified on the University website. Reservation under ECA and Sports categories is not available in courses where admission is based on entrance tests.

Guidelines for Admissions under Extracurricular Activities (ECA)

The admission of ECA applicants shall be administered through centralized trials based on the preferences of courses and colleges as indicated by the applicants. For more information refer to university bulletin.

1. Applicants seeking admission under ECA category will register online on the DU Admissions portal.
2. There will be an additional registration fee of Rs. 100 to apply in the ECA category besides the charges for (UR/OBC/SC/ST/PwD/EWS) registration.
3. Applicants may register for a maximum of three ECA categories.
4. Not more than 15% concession in academic merit vis-à-vis Unreserved Category applicants for the last relevant cut-off may be given for admission to a specific course subject to course-specific eligibility criteria. Admissions under ECA category will only be allowed to applicants satisfying the course-specific minimum eligibility criteria.
5. Applicants are required to upload only one certificate (preferably that with the highest achievement) issued for the period May 1, 2016 up to April 30, 2019, in each Category they wish to apply for as a proof of their involvement in the relevant Category. They should carry all the relevant certificates for evaluation in case they are selected for final trials.
6. ECA trials will be held at two levels: (i) Preliminary trials; (ii) Final trials. The trials for admission under the ECA category shall be conducted by an ECA Committee (Admissions) appointed by the University Admission Committee and approved by the competent authority.
7. Dates and venues for the preliminary and final trials shall be notified and displayed on the University Website.

8. The applicant shall be allowed to appear in the preliminary trials only once in an event. Any request for a second chance at trials will not be permitted.
9. Based on the preliminary trials, applicants short-listed for the final trials will be notified on the University Website.
10. Evaluation of Certificates by the ECA Admission Committee will be done only for those applicants who qualify for the final trials. The applicants must carry all the relevant certificates in original (and with self-attested photocopies) for evaluation at the time of the final trial.
11. The Final Merit lists shall be based on ECA performance (in the Final Trials) and certificate evaluation with a weightage of 75:25 respectively.
12. The applicant must secure at least 50% marks in the final trials (38 out of 75) to be eligible for inclusion in the Final Merit lists of selected candidates. Subcategory-wise Final Merit lists will be prepared for all eligible applicants only.
13. In case of a tie in the final marks (out of 100), the candidate with higher marks in the trials (out of 75) will be placed higher in the Final Merit list. In case a tie still persists, all such candidates will have the same rank.
14. The preliminary and final trials will be videographed and recordings would be preserved till the last date of admission.
15. Subcategory-wise Final Merit Lists of the applicants, showing marks awarded for the ECA certificates and for performances in the Final Trials, shall be notified on the University Website.
16. Selection in a final Merit list does not guarantee admission to an applicant. Admission is subject to the availability of seats in a course/college for the relevant ECA sub-category.
17. The existing provision of not more than 5% Sports and ECA quota (subject-wise) is continued as per circular No. Aca.I/ Sports / 2010-11 / 178 dated May 29, 2010. However, in case of a greater demand in a particular course, upto a maximum of double the number of sanctioned seats in the said course under the ECA category may be admitted by the college subject to overall ceiling of 5% sports and ECA Quota.
18. Applicants will have to register in the colleges of their choice according to the schedule that will be notified on College/University websites.
19. The allotment of the course/subject to the qualified applicants shall conform to the University regulations. The admission of applicants thereafter will be completed on the University Admission Portal.
20. The selected candidates shall submit an Undertaking at the time of admission stating that the candidate will perform for the College and University for the entire period of the candidate's undergraduate course of study. The college has a right to cancel their admissions if they violate the undertaking during their stay in college.
21. Any candidate submitting false/fake certificates will be debarred from admission to any course in any college for three years. If a candidate seeks admission on the basis of false/fake certificates, not only will the admissions be cancelled, an FIR may also be registered.
22. The college shall maintain a proper record of candidates admitted on the basis of ECA.
23. The list (soft copy) of finally admitted applicants on the basis of ECA shall be sent to Delhi University Culture Council by the constituent Colleges within seven days of the last date of admission of the University of Delhi.
24. The decision of the ECA Admission Committee shall be final.

Guidelines for Admission on the Basis of Sports

The constituent Colleges shall follow the guidelines given below for admission on the basis of Sports in for Undergraduate courses. They will communicate as per the Proforma sent by the University the total number of seats under Sports Quota (Supernumerary) along with requirement of Position/Event/Weight Category in different Game/Sport to the University. The College should also notify the same on their College website. The applicant should go through the Bulletin of Information for UG courses and notifications issued from time to time on the website of Colleges/University of Delhi.

Reservation of Seats for Foreign Applicants

All foreign applicants including those who have completed their schooling from an Indian Board may be treated as Foreign Students for the purpose of their registration/admission in various Departments and Colleges of the University and they may be considered for admission under 5% quota prescribed for foreign students. The foreign applicants seeking admission to Undergraduate course should apply online through the Foreign Students' Registry portal <http://fsr.du.ac.in> and can contact the Deputy Dean (Foreign Students' Registry), Conference Centre, University of Delhi-110007.

Procedure For Admission

First Year of the Bachelor's Degree Course

1. Pre-registration is a must for getting admission.
2. The applicant should have passed the Class XII examination of any Board/University examination in India or in any foreign country recognized as equivalent to the 10+2 system by the Association of Indian Universities (AIU).
3. There is no minimum age bar for admission to undergraduate courses.
4. Applicants with gap year(s) will not be at any disadvantage for the purpose of admission to undergraduate courses.
5. The cut off percentage for admission to each course will be put up on the university website and college notice board/website on dates as per schedule notified by the Delhi University. No individual intimation regarding admission will be sent.
6. After declaration of the Cut-off lists, eligible applicants should present themselves in person for admission. The applicant should bring the following original documents:
 - a. Certificate and marksheet of class X.
 - b. Marksheet of class XII
 - c. Character Certificate and Provisional Certificate from the institution last attended.
 - d. Transfer and migration certificate. (For outstation candidates).
 - e. 3 unattested recent passport size photograph.
 - f. Two sets of attested photocopies of the above certificates.
 - g. SC/ST/OBC/EWS/CW/KM Certificate (in the name of the Applicant) issued by the competent authority. (The names of applicants claiming reservation under SC/ST/OBC/EWS/CW/KM must match with the names that appear on their corresponding School Board qualifying certificates; similarly their parents' names must match in both sets of certificates).

The University will accept self-attested copies of documents/papers provided by the students. It is made clear that if any false attestation / falsified records are detected, the student will be debarred from attending any course in the University/or its Colleges for next five years and in addition, a criminal case under relevant sections of IPC (viz. 470, 471, 474etc.) will be instituted against him/her.

SC/ST/OBC/EWS will be subjected to the verification of certificate by appropriate authority. If the certificate is found fake, the admission will be cancelled.

The differently-abled applicants should bring the latest certificate of disability not exceeding six months prior to the date of admission. 5% seats in all under graduate and post graduate will be reserved for candidates having minimum 40% physical disabilities.

7. Documents to be submitted on Orientation Day (i.e.19th of July 2019)
 - a) As per the requirements of Ordinance XV-B, it is mandatory for every student to submit an anti-ragging affidavit on notarized non-judicial stamp paper of Rs. 50/-.
 - b) Two undertaking forms each duly signed by the student and parent should be submitted to the Teacher-InCharge of the concerned department.
8. Admission to all courses are routed through various committees constituted for the purpose. Applicants are requested not to approach the Principal in connection with admissions.
9. No student who qualifies on the basis of the percentage indicated in the cut-off list shall be

denied admission provided she pays the fees by the stipulated date and time and has applied online on University portal.

10. Every student shall be required to sign a declaration to submit herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Principal, Vice-Chancellor and other authorities in accordance with the Statutes and Ordinances of University of Delhi.
11. All admissions are subject to the approval of University of Delhi.

For Admission to M.A. Part-I

1. An applicant must have passed the Bachelors Degree Examination (10+2+3).
2. For admission to M.A., students must apply directly to the appropriate Faculty in the University of Delhi for registration. No decision regarding admission to the College will be taken prior to the preliminary selection. The candidates selected by respective faculties would become eligible for admission in the college.

Foreign Students

All foreign applicants including those who have completed their schooling from an Indian Board may be treated as Foreign Students for the purpose of their registration/admission in various Departments and Colleges of the University and they may be considered for admission under 5% quota prescribed for foreign students. The foreign applicants seeking admission to Undergraduate course should apply online through the Foreign Students' Registry portal <http://fsr.du.ac.in> and can contact the Deputy Dean (Foreign Students' Registry), Conference Centre, University of Delhi-110007.

Admission on the basis of Excellence in ECA

Admission to various courses in the academic year 2019-20 on the basis of extra-curricular activity (ECA) will be strictly as per University of Delhi guidelines. Under these guidelines ECA committee has been constituted which will be admitting students under extracurricular activity quota. The Complete schedule for the trials (preliminary and final) will be notified on the Delhi University website. The final list of selected applicants containing marks awarded for the ECA certificates and trials shall be displayed on the University Website.

List of Original Certificates to be presented at the time of admission

- 1) Documents in support of achievements in ECA, on the basis of which admission is sought (for last 3 years only i.e. 1st April 2016 to 31st March 2019).
- 2) A letter of recommendation from the head/principal/officiating authority of the institution last attended, giving details of the activities in which the candidate has participated. This letter is not mandatory but desirable.
- 3) Marksheet of class XII on the basis of which the admission is sought.
- 4) Provisional/pass certificate of last exam passed.
- 5) Conduct/character certificate from the institution last attended.
- 6) School Examination certificate (class X certificate), stating date of birth.
- 7) Transfer and Migration certificate, for outstation candidates.

8) Caste certificate [reserved categories - SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer)]

Following are the activities on the basis of which a candidate can seek admission under the ECA category :

1. The allotment of Programme to the eligible applicant shall conform to University regulations and will be the sole responsibility of the College and may be finalized by the Sports Admission Committee of the College which will include:
 - a. Chairperson: Principal

- b. Convener: Teacher in-charge, Department of Physical Education
- c. Member/s: Teacher/s, Department of Physical Education
- d. Nominee: One faculty member of the Staff Council
2. The Sports Admission Committee of the College shall:
 - a. Screen the application form uploaded by the applicant
 - b. Verify original Merit/Participation Sports Certificate of the applicant as per marks allotted by DUSC.
3. In Case of Tie : Applicants securing same marks in the same Game/ Sport eligible to take admission in the same Programme in the college, it may be resolved by the Sports Admission Committee of the College.
 - (a) Applicant securing higher marks in Sports Trials will be placed/ given higher preference.
 - (b) If the Tie still persists, all the applicants may be admitted.
4. The grievance related to allocation of marks for Merit/Participation Sports Certificate and Sports Trial shall be redressed by the UG Sports Grievance Committee of the DUSC.
5. The list of finally selected applicants containing marks of the Sports Certificates and Sports Trials along with Programmes allotted shall be displayed on the Website and Notice Board of the College for three days, to take cognizance of the grievances, if any. The Grievance Committee of the College must resolve all the grievances within next three working days before admitting the applicants.
6. The list (soft and hard copy) of finally admitted applicant on the basis of Sports shall be sent to DUSC within seven days from the last date of admission of the University by the constituent Colleges.
7. The College shall maintain a proper record of the applicants admitted on the basis of Sports.
8. The applicant, as per their age must be eligible to participate in Inter-University Competitions for the next three years and should not be employed on Part-time/Full-time basis any where.
9. Any injury/casualty caused to the applicant during Sports Trials shall be the sole responsibility of the applicant.
10. It is mandatory to submit an Undertaking **on Non-Judicial Stamp Paper of Rs. 100/- by the applicant at the time of admission stating that he/she will play for the College and University during their Under-Graduate Programmes of study.**

Note: If none of the candidate is found suitable for any particular game then the College has the right to transfer the seat allotted for the game to any other game.

For payment of Fees students with physical disabilities should refer to the Delhi University Admission Brochure 2019-20.

** Caution Money is Refundable if claimed before the end of Financial Year in which the student leaves the college. Caution Money will be refunded through RTGS/NEFT. Student should have her own account in any bank.*

University/College reserves right to revise Fee and other charges any time during the year.

Financial Assistance To Students

1. Partial or full fee concession may be granted to economically weak students. **Application for fee concession must be submitted on the prescribed Form obtainable from the Accounts Section, duly supported by income certificate attested by the Magistrate/Civil Officer/Employer. The application complete in all respects must be submitted to the Accounts section, latest by end of August in the year.**
2. Fee concession granted is subject to good conduct, regular attendance and satisfactory progress in studies and may be withdrawn any time if a student is found neglecting any of these.
3. Students belonging to Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes are awarded Post-Matric Scholarships by the Directorate of Education, Delhi Administration. Forms will be available in the College Office. These should be filled, accompanied by necessary certificates/ documents.
4. All forms will be available from the College office free of charge. In addition to the above concessions, ad-hoc grants may be given from "Student Aid Fund". **Students desiring to avail this aid must contact the Convener of Students' Amenities Committee.**
5. Notices of scholarships granted by Delhi Administration, University of Delhi or other agencies are displayed on the College Notice Board from time to time as and when they are received.
6. Eligible SC/ST, OBC, PwD Students etc should submit their scholarship form for the academic year by February for processing scholarship to SC/ST, OBC, PwD etc each year.
7. Students should take financial assistance from one source only and for that they have to submit the application to SO.

Note: The Students' Amenities Committee is in charge of students' amenities. Students are welcome to seek the Committee's assistance



Academic Requirements

The students of the College are governed by the rules and regulations of the University of Delhi as laid down in Ordinance VII of the University Calendar. The students are required to attend all lectures, tutorials/ preceptorials and practicals regularly. **As per University rules a student is required to attend not less than two thirds of total lectures and practicals, separately, held in the college in each academic year/semester (67% in each year/semester). Students not fulfilling the attendance requirement may be debarred from appearing in the University examination.**

Students selected/ deputed to participate in annual NCC camp or NSS assignments or inter-college/ national/international sports or extra-curricular activities approved by the Principal may be condoned up to a maximum of one third lectures and practicals held.

In case of illness the leave application must be accompanied by a medical certificate and fitness certificate which should be submitted to the college office after getting the signature of the teachers concerned.

Please note that shortage of attendance will not be condoned for attending other courses of study outside the college.

University Examination and Promotions

1. The University examination schedule and rules of promotions as prescribed by the University of Delhi will be applicable.

Internal Assessment Scheme

As per decision of University of Delhi 25% of the total marks in each paper will be allotted for the internal assessment as per Ordinance-VIII-E of the University Calendar.

Guidelines for Under-Graduate Courses in CBCS Semester Mode Internal Assessment as per Ordinance VIII-E

Internal Assessment shall carry 25% weightage and End Semester Examination 75% weightage. The distribution of Internal Assessment marks shall be as follows:

5% weightage to be given for regularity in attending lectures and tutorials. The credit for regularity in each paper, based on attendance, shall be as follows:

80% or more but less than 85%	4 Marks
85% and above	5 Marks

ECA/NSS/NCC benefits to be given as per university ordinances and rules and should not exceed 1/3rd of the total number of lectures held per semester.

At the end of the semester, the attendance of every student in each paper in lectures and tutorials be summed up, converted into percentage, and marks awarded for Internal Assessment by the teacher. With the introduction of Internal Assessment, the maximum marks for the University Examination in each paper shall stand reduced accordingly. For Example:

- for a 100 marks paper, the University Examination shall be of 75 marks.**
- for a 75 marks paper, the University Examination shall be of 55 marks.**
- for a 50 marks paper, the University Examination shall be of 38 marks.**
- for 53 marks paper, the University Examination shall be of 25 marks.**

In the case of a student who is selected as a member of the N.C.C. to participate in the annual N.C.C. Camps or is deputed to undertake Civil Defence work and allied duties, or in the case of a student who is enrolled in the National Service Scheme and is deputed to various public assignment by or with the approval of the Head of the institution concerned, or a student who is selected to participate in sports or other activities organized by the Inter-University Board or is selected to participated in sports or other activities organized by the Vice-Chancellor, or a student who is required to represent the University at the Inter University Youth Festival, or a student who is required to participate in periodical training in the Territorial Army, or a student who is deputed by the College to take part Inter-College sports, fixtures, debates seminars, symposia a social work projects, or a student who is required to represent the College concerned in debates and other extra-curricular activities held in other Universities or such other activities approved by the Vice-Chancellor, the following provision will apply:

- (i) A student in the categories listed above, will have to fulfill the requirement of written assignments and projects/term papers/seminars/field-work with the flexibility, however that she may, if necessary, be allowed additional time for submission of written assignments.
- (ii) A student in the categories listed above, will get the benefit or attendance for internal Assessment for the classes missed as per the existing provisions of Ordinance VII. 2(9)(a)(I).

The University reserves the right to review, and if necessary moderate the marks in any paper / papers in any College/Department.

Medical certificates shall be excluded while calculating credit towards marks to be awarded for regularity, though such certificates shall continue to be taken into account for the purpose of calculating eligibility to appear for examinations as per the existing provisions of Ordinance VII.2.9.(a)(ii).

Payment of Fee

All fee receipts should be preserved for scrutiny and should be produced at the time of filling up the examination forms and refund of caution money. Notice regarding payment of College/ Examination fee will be put upon the notice board.

Identity Card

Every student is issued an identity card by the College. It is mandatory for the students to carry them every day. In case of any kind of indiscipline, the I-card will be confiscated. In case of loss of I-card the students are advised to intimate the college office immediately. Duplicate I-card will be issued on payment of Rs. 100/-Any change of address or phone no. should also be notified by the student.

Discipline

Students will be governed as per Ordinance XV-B of the University Calendar.



Choice Based Credit System (CBCS): Guidelines

1. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (Lecture/tutorial) or two are of practical or field work per week. The duration of classes may be decided accordingly by the principals of colleges.
2. The number of papers under core course, elective and ability enhancement courses and their respective credits for different undergraduate programmes is as per UGC's guidelines.
3. The examination scheme as approved by the Academic Council and Executive Council for the undergraduate courses under CBCS by amending Ordinances VIII (2) and ordinance IX.
4. As per standard, the size of the tutorials is 10-15 students. The Principals of the respective Colleges may decide about the class size and tutorial size as per their requirement according to prescribed standards.
5. The generic elective courses offered by the departments will be taught by teachers of the same departments.
6. The Principals of the colleges may take decision for offering more than one general elective papers to be opted by the students in each semester.
7. A student admitted in a particular department can opt for general elective courses offered by the other department, for example, a student admitted under B.A. (Hons.) History programme cannot opt for general elective courses offered by the department of History.
8. The core papers of English/Hindi/MIL as part of two languages required to be studied is different from the courses of English/Hindi/MIL under Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC).
9. The student of B.Sc. (Hons.) Botany and B.Sc. (Hons.) Zoology must opt one or two General Elective papers offered by Department of chemistry so that their eligibility for admission in various Institutions is not hampered.
10. Similarly, students admitted under B.Sc. Programme and willing to pursue post -graduation in Physics/ Chemistry/ Electronics must opt a paper of Mathematics as General Elective, if Mathematics is not one of the core discipline being studied.
11. The student of B.Sc.(Hons.)/ B.A.(Hons.)/ B.Com.(Hons.) in order to be eligible for post-graduate in another discipline may opt for the General Elective of a particular subject in each semester to earn 24 credits in the concerned discipline.

Departmental Profile

Department of Biochemistry



The Department of Biochemistry was started in the year 1988 and offers a BSc (Hons) course. This course covers areas in basic Biochemistry such as biomolecules, proteins, enzymology and intermediary metabolism, as well as advanced areas in Biology such as cell biology, physiology, hormone biochemistry, nutritional biochemistry, biochemistry of diseases, immunology, molecular biology, genetics and recombinant DNA technology. The department has well equipped laboratories wherein all modern biology experiments can be conducted. In addition, a *Drosophila* Resource Centre, Zebra fish lab facility and Biotechnological application centre in recycling unit has been established, where students can undertake short term training, and research internships. These advance research facilities have been established under the Star College Project Funds granted as part of the Star Status awarded to the college science departments, by the Department of Biotechnology, GOI and UGC grants. Over the years, the department has been awarded projects from the Department of Science and Technology, DU Innovation Projects, Star Innovation projects and DRDO to faculty members. The department has the distinction of having over 90% first classes as well as University positions every year. Graduates from the department have been selected for

integrated Ph.D and MSc programmes through entrance exams in Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Molecular Biology, Neurosciences and other Life Science courses in leading scientific Institutions such as IISC (Bengaluru), TIFR-NCBS, ISER (Pune), JNU, UDSC as well as Cambridge and Universities in the US. The department is proud of its alumni who hold faculty/scientific positions at prestigious US universities, JNU, DRDO, Delhi University Biochemistry Department, and many undergraduate Colleges. The department has its own Biochemistry Association which organizes freshers' Welcome and Farewell party and it also hosts several co-curricular activities.

Department of Botany



The Botany Department of Daulat Ram College completed 50 glorious years of its existence last year. It is one of the leading Departments of Delhi University and was established in 1968. The department is a part of Star College Project, awarded by the Department of Biotechnology, Govt. of India since 2011. With its competent and dedicated faculty, the department is actively involved in devising innovative means of teaching and research in plant sciences. Based on the academic and research performances of students and faculty members, Department of Botany along with four other Science departments of the College, was awarded

prestigious “Star College Status” by DBT, Govt. of India in 2014 . The Department has well equipped, projector fitted, air conditioned classrooms, laboratories, museum, culture room with tissue culture facility and a botanical garden. Keeping in pace with the recent advancements in the field of plant sciences and the revised undergraduate curriculum thereof, the department regularly organizes workshops, seminars, conferences and skill enhancement courses for students as well as faculty members. As a part of Golden Jubilee celebration a Symposium on “Environment and Sustainable Development- New Perspectives” was successfully organised on 14th February 2019. For a better and in-depth understanding of the subjects taught in classroom, the department organizes educational trips to various Research Institutes, Biodiversity Parks, and Industries for students. Apart from academics, the students are given a chance to showcase their talent and creativity by participating in various co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the botanical society “Vasundhara”. The annual inter college botanical festival “Orchidz” is also celebrated with great enthusiasm. “Liana”, the botanical society magazine gives the student a platform to learn and contribute about interesting and latest events in the field of plant sciences. Thus, the three year CBCS course in B.Sc. (Hons) Botany and B.Sc. Life Sciences, not only gives the student an in-depth knowledge about the subject, but also equips them to face the new challenges in the field of plant science research.

Department of Chemistry



Chemistry is one of the leading subject in pure sciences which offers the students an epitome platform to explore the fascinating world of atoms and molecules, their interactions as well as transformations. Chemistry is sometimes called the central science as it bridges other natural sciences like physics, geology and biology. The three year honours course is a fine balance of Inorganic, Organic and physical chemistry integrated with related fields like physics ,Mathematics, Computer Applications, Biochemistry, Environmental studies, Biology etc. which enables the students to create an awareness of issues with in chemistry that overlap with other related disciplines. After graduation, student can get enrolled in PG courses such as M.Sc. in Inorganic, Organic, Physical, analytical chemistry, Polymer science, Forensic Science, Material science, Biotechnology, Nanotechnology etc. They can also pursue MBA, MCA and B.Ed. A qualification in chemistry opens door to a wide range of careers that includes teaching, industry (both chemical and pharmaceutical) and research.

The department has highly qualified, dedicated and experienced faculty. Department has well equipped laboratories for regular practical classes as well research activities. Department has been awarded star status by DBT. It has been running DBT star college project since 2011. Department has also completed nine innovation projects out of which one was Best Innovative Idea Award for the year 2014-15 by University of Delhi.

National and International conferences were organized (November 2016 and March 2018) to make participants aware about new scientific developments, and to provide connect with other attendees from different perspectives and views. Faculty development programme was organized to benefit the faculty members of different colleges to enrich their knowledge, diverse skills and ability to integrate technology into teaching, learning and research activities.

Department also organizes skill development programmes for students during summer and winter breaks to enhance the learning by hands on experiences with various analytical techniques and green methodologies which helps them in pursuing careers in academics, research and industry.

The Department of Commerce, which will be completing its 50 years this academic session, offers two courses B.Com. (Hons.) and B.Com. These courses equip the students with the requisite knowledge and skills to meet the demands of competitive business arena. Through subjects like Accounts, Taxation, Marketing, Finance, Law, Computers etc., students gain an in-depth understanding of the intricacies of business functioning and its environment. This provides the foundation for students to pursue professional courses such as C.A., CS, ICWA, L.L.B, and MBA. The Department has experienced faculty which constantly mentors the students in pursuing their career goals and helps them in realising their potential.

Through its Annual Fest 'Comvision', students

are provided a platform to showcase and develop their talent and creativity by organising and participating in various events such as Business Plan, Debate, Group Discussion, Ad-Mad etc. The Department also organises skill development programmes, seminars and workshops for students on various contemporary topics such as Startups, Goods and Services Tax, and Research Methodology. The Economics Department of Daulat Ram College was established in 1960. The

Department offers a complete three year undergraduate B.A. (H) Economics course. In line with Choice based Credit System, it offers various interdisciplinary courses like Introductory Microeconomics, Introductory Macroeconomics, Money and Banking and Indian Economics to students of other courses. Skill Enhancement Compulsory courses like Research Methodology and Contemporary Economic Issues are also offered to the students to enhance and supplement their understanding of the subject. The cut off for admissions to the course for the last 5 years has been in the range of 95%-97%.

Department of English

course in English Literature teaches the students to engage with a whole range of literary texts spanning across different countries and time periods, including diverse genres and categories. Canonical texts co-exist with popular fiction and cinema. Students are taught to read not just the surface texts but also the subtexts as well as silences; and are sensitized to the existence of multiple contexts and realities. In addition to the sheer joy of enjoying classic instances of creativity, this course prepares students for a career in academics, teaching, creative writing, mass communication, journalism, editing and publishing, civil services, theatre, career counselling, to name a few.

"Literati" – the English Literary Association is a vibrant and active society, which regularly conducts workshops and invites eminent resource persons to address and interact with the students. The weekly Study Circle involves students in paper presentations, panel discussions and other interactive sessions. The Department of English believes in an interdisciplinary pedagogical approach and encourages the students to step out of the classroom and engage with literary texts as performances, book readings, film screenings and talks. Interacting with authors, scholars, critics, theatre personnel and performance artists proves to be an immensely enriching experience for the students; as literature too, comes alive for them in the process. The department has organized several National Conferences, one National Literary Meet, Faculty Development Programme and student seminars. It conducts regular tutorials for MA students. The Department holds an exciting annual inter-college Literary Festival. In 2016, the Department published a book titled Interpretations, comprising research articles of students and faculty members. Department of History



The department of History was set up in the year 1960, when the discipline was offered in the B.A. Programme course. Subsequently, it was upgraded as a full-fledged Honours course. Today the department also offers many interdisciplinary papers to students from other departments in the form of general elective and skill enhancement courses. The syllabus offered by the department covers both Indian and World History from antiquity to the contemporary period. The department has dedicated and qualified professors, with a

variety of research and teaching specialization. The teaching methodology is interdisciplinary with a hands-on approach, with emphasis on interactive classes, group discussions, field trips and movie screenings. Students are encouraged to go beyond the textbooks for completing their projects and assignments. Audio-visual media is used during the lectures and tutorial classes. The department is visited by many eminent historians and scholars every semester, who deliver lectures and interact with the students. We also have a well-stocked library with books in English and Hindi.

The department regularly organizes various skill enhancement courses. We have collaborated with institutions like INTACH, and encourage students to apply for internships in the National Archives, National Museum, Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, Archaeological Survey of India and other organizations. While research and teaching are obvious career options for History students, the course also provides foundation for other career opportunities in Social work, Tourism, Heritage Management, Publication, Journalism and Bureaucracy. Besides, students could also embark on highly specialized courses after graduating in History like archaeology, numismatics, epigraphy, Indology, museology, archival studies, and art conservation, preservation and management.

Initially Mathematics was offered as one of the Discipline subjects in B.A. (Prog.). Later on, B.Sc. (H) Mathematics was introduced in the year 2006. At present, the department offers B. Sc. (H) Mathematics to the students of all streams (Humanities, Commerce and Science) under the CBCS course structure. Besides the Honours course, it is offered as a Discipline course B.A. Programme and General Elective course for other B.A. (H) and B.Sc. (H) courses. The course structure allows the students to develop conceptual and geometrical understanding and a deeper approach to learning via the use of advanced software such as Mathematica. An undergraduate degree in Mathematics enables students to go for Masters in Mathematics, Statistics, Operational Research, MBA, MCA, Actuarial sciences etc. Study of Mathematics provides path leading to a variety of exciting professional careers such as civil services, banking industries or in teaching.

Department of Music



The music department was established in 1971 and since then its dedicated faculty has been working for academic and cultural growth of the college. It offers B.A. programme course in music and teaches Classical Music (Vocal) and Classical Instrumental (Sitar) covering different

areas of Hindustani Music. The department also registers students for three years B.A. Honors course and two years M.A. Music course for which classes are held in the faculty of music, University of Delhi. The course familiarizes the students with the fundamentals of various ragas, history of music and life-sketches of great musicians and musicologists. It helps them to develop their potential in music and opens up channels for entry into post graduation, M. Phil, Ph. D in Music and teaching career later on.

Department of Nutrition and Health Education (NHE)



The Department of Nutrition & Health Education (NHE) was set up in 1984, the year in which Delhi University introduced a number of restructured courses in B.A. (Pass) and B.Sc. (Gen). It is the oldest NHE department of the University. Under CBCS, it is offering B.A. Programme with NHE. The course enables the students to understand and apply fundamentals of nutrition and health at the family level and make them aware of the various nutrition and health related problems in the community. Department of Philosophy

Department of Zoology



Zoology department of Daulat Ram College was

established in 1968 and currently holds star department status by Department of Biotechnology, Government of India. Department supports undergraduate teaching for both Zoology (Hons) and life science (program) courses. In the Choice Based Credit System, department is also offering generic elective course for Botany, Biochemistry and Chemistry departments & Skill-enhancement courses for Daulat Ram College students. Department introduces its students to the fascinating world of animal sciences and follows Delhi University syllabus prescribed by the different courses of Zoology.

Zoology Department facilitates learning in classical and modern systematic aspects of animal diversity to the students of Zoology (Hons) and life science undergraduates. The department has an active Zoological Society which organises special lectures, debates, excursions to wild life National Parks, Sanctuaries, National Laboratories and Academic Institutions. On completion of the Honours course, students have the choice to pursue a post graduate degree in fields like Biomedical Science, Zoology, Immunology, Biotechnology, Entomology, Fisheries, Agriculture, Genetics, Molecular Biology, Microbiology, Environmental Management or Bioinformatics and pursue Ph.D. Programs. Our students have great success stories, many of them have become professors at different central universities and CSIR laboratories. Many of our students have also joined Indian

Administrative Services or US federal services and settled abroad.

Apart from teaching, our faculties are also involved in performing basic research, mentoring students to undertake simple innovative projects and present their work in national and international conferences. Students from zoology department also gets an opportunity to get training in Immunology at NII, New Delhi, under Science-Setu programme-MOU signed with DBT, NII and college. Department has established a Drosophila Resource Center under DBT-star college which under mentorship of Dr. Chitra Bhasin carries student development program every year. Our undergraduates get ample opportunity to learn working with Drosophila model system. Departmental teachers have been actively involved in carrying projects on e-literacy, Polycystic ovarian syndrome and many more. Department is supported by DST, DBT & UGC grants, Neuropharmacology & drug delivery laboratory of zoology department is also providing opportunity to pursue PhD from zoology department under mentorship of Dr. Amar Jyoti.

Our alumni of the department are very well placed at various prestigious institutions. Our department has celebrated its golden jubilee year in 2018 and is one of the most sought after department of the college.

Facilities Provided:

Library and Reading Room

Library and Reading Room facilities are open only to students and staff of the college. The College Library possesses an excellent collection of more than 1,20,000 books and journals/periodicals. The Library is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on week days i.e. Monday to Friday. On Saturday, library is open for students but books issue and return facility is not available. The Library is completely digitalized with latest software's. Library boasts of a separate Braille Section with software's such as (Angel: Talking Digital Pocket Daisy Player, E-Book Reader, MP3 Player, Radio cum voice Recorder) for the benefit of differently-abled students.

Terms and Conditions for Issuing of Books

1. Before leaving the counter, the member should ensure that the book lent to her is in sound condition, if not, she should immediately bring it to the notice of the Librarian. Otherwise she would be liable for any loss/ damage and required to replace it with a sound/ fresh copy.
2. Periodicals, directories, encyclopaedias, which might be difficult to replace and other books that are declared reference books by the Librarian would not be lent out.
3. Members are not allowed to sub-lend the books of the library.
4. Students who return books later than the due date will be liable to pay a fine as decided by the College authorities from time to time.
5. At present the fine for general section books is ₹ 1 per day for first fifteen days of delay. Thereafter, it will be ₹ 5 per day for one month, after which the fine will be ₹ 10 per day. Fine for Reserved Section books is ₹ 2 per day for first week and thereafter it is ₹ 10 per day.
6. Any infringement of the rules will deprive the member of the privilege of admission to and of borrowing books from the Library.
7. Each student of M.A. course is entitled to borrow six books at a time.
8. The Library membership will be valid till the student leaves the college.
9. Timings for Issue and Return of Books:
 - (i) Books from General Section are issued and returned from 9.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m.
 - (ii) Books from Reserved Section are issued and returned from 12.30 p.m. to 4.00 p.m.
 - (iii) Books from Reference Section are only issued for consultation in the Library against Reference Card from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Teachers Study Room

The college has a well-maintained teacher's study room adjacent to library which is equipped with computer facility and lockers. The study area is Wi-Fi enabled, promoting easy access to research and study material.





Laboratories

The College has well equipped and well managed laboratories for all the Science Courses offered by it, viz. Bio-Chemistry, Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology. The Departments of Nutrition & Health Education, Maths and Psychology also have separate well equipped labs.

Computer Lab

The College has well equipped Computer Labs with Pentium machines powered by the latest configuration. The Labs have connectivity with the Delhi University intranet with access to the internet. The main computer lab has 38 computers and there is an additional computer lab for Commerce and Mathematics students. The Commerce computer lab and Maths computer lab have 40 computer terminals each. The Maths computer lab has licensed UBUNTU version 8.1 and licensed SPSS for students and faculty.

College Auditorium-Sadbhavna Bhawan

The college auditorium, Sadbhavna Bhawan is a proscenium hall with a large stage and a seating capacity of over 1400, ideally suited for theatre activities and dramatics with plays having large cast. All major intra-college and inter-college events also take place in the auditorium.

Conference Hall

The Conference Hall has a capacity of 200. Since its inception in October 2016 it has been venue of a large number of academic workshops, seminars and conferences. The hall is fully air-conditioned, Wi-Fi enabled with digital projection and best audio facility. The college host inter-college, intra-college and departmental activities in this hall. It has been a big asset for the college.

Seminar Hall

The Seminar Hall of the college is the place for multifarious activities throughout the year. The activities in the seminar room range from curricular and co-curricular seminars, lectures, debates, discussions and workshops to Student Union functions, and activities related to NSS and Women Development Centre. It serves as a perfect venue for hosting departmental farewell and freshers' programs. It is air conditioned, with a seating capacity of 200 people. Its wooden panels allow space division making the large area convenient to be used for simultaneous multipurpose activities.

Amphitheatre

The open-air amphitheatre, namely Rangshala, offers a stage to the young students to hone their talent, communication and performance skills. It has been witness to many famous events and has provided a forum to many burgeoning artists. It is the perfect spot for nukkad natak, societies' practice, dance performances. It has been a venue for hoisting national flag during Republic Day and Independence Day celebrations.

Medical Room

Medical room with an attendant nurse and first aid facilities is available from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The students can also avail of the World University Health Service of the University of Delhi against the nominal annual fee of Rupees five.

College Canteen

The College canteen offers a varied menu at subsidized rates. The College canteen provides healthy and nutritious food for students. A range of cuisines are freshly and hygienically prepared and made available for breakfast and lunch. Apart from cooked choices, students can buy branded packed snacks too.

Nescafe Corner

Located amidst the bank and canteen, the Nescafe corner serves as a serene space for out-of-the-classrooms brainstorming sessions. The kiosk provides a range of hot and cold beverages and accompaniments. The outdoor benches and circular tables add to the charm of the place.

Bank

The College has banking facilities on its premises. The University Branch of Indian Overseas Bank operates in the College. It also has an ATM facility for students.

Placement Cell

The Placement Cell of Daulat Ram College lives by its motto "If one dreams to do it, one can do it, and we vow to provide all the aid we can". The Placement Cell works with dedication and enthusiasm to provide the best internship and recruitment opportunities to the students. The Placement Cell assists students in preparing for recruitment and selection process by organising workshops and sessions on soft skills, CV writing and group discussions etc. It has conducted various recruitment drives throughout the year in which companies such as Deloitte, Ernst & Young GDS, PwC, KPMG India, Teach for India, Willis Towers Watson, FIS Global, Genpact, S&P Global, Finedge, Cvent, EY India and many more had come for recruitment. In 2018-19, more than 140 recruitment letters were made with average CTC package of ₹ 3.9 lakhs per year and the highest CTC offered to the students was ₹ 6.04 lakhs per annum. The Placement Cell also took the initiative of sharing various job opportunities with our alumnae, such as FIS Global, Edumentor, XL Dynamics, Hilti India, Genpact and EY India.

The Placement cell also organized an Internship and Career fair- 'INCREMENTUM -2.0' on 5th February, 2019, where about 50 reputed companies and NGO's participated in this fair for both recruitment and internship opportunities, such as Teach for India, Dhvani RIS, My First Boss for Outlook, Toplrn, Young Engine, IGIA, Umeed, What after College, Goonj, DCOP, Sharekhan and many more for various profiles like Human Resources, Project Management, Content Development, Photography, Marketing and Social Work. The fair saw footfall of around 1000 students from different colleges and Universities.

The Placement Cell offers position of Junior Executive and as Volunteers to the first-year students to be part of its team. The Orientation Programme for freshers would be organised by Placement Cell in

Psychology Resource Centre

The Psychology Resource Centre (PRC) addresses the psycho-social needs of the students, teachers and non-teaching staff, that is, to be aware of and effectively manage with everyday life issues and stressors which include self-growth and development, handling stress and emotions, relationship issues, academic pressures, constant worry and anxiety. With changing times, human life has become increasingly stressful making it imperative for people to be aware and develop a psychological understanding of themselves and their surroundings. This is achieved by PRC provides counseling services, Faculty Development Programs, functions and events that address the mental health and well-being of all stakeholders. PRC includes: Mental Health Center, Value Education Center, Positive Psychology Centre and Capacity Building Centre.

Drosophila Resource Center

Drosophila Resource Centres was set up in 2011 in the Department of Biochemistry by Dr. Sunita Joshi and the Department of Zoology by Dr. Chitra Bhasin under aegis of Star College Project, Department of Biotechnology, Govt. of India. These centres were set up with the objective of serving as training and resource centres using *Drosophila melanogaster* (Banana fruit fly) model system in studying Genetics, Evolutionary Biology, Developmental Biology and Cell Biology. Regular hands on training programs and workshops are conducted to provide training to Faculty and students from departments of Biochemistry, Botany, life Science and Zoology of Delhi University Colleges. *Drosophila* wild and mutant stocks are maintained and provided to many colleges of Delhi University to conduct lab experiments in Genetics, Developmental Biology and Cell Biology. A lab manual on 'Rediscovering Genetics' authored by Dr. Sunita Joshi and Dr. Neeru Dhamija was published in 2016 that covered the range of experiments performed in Genetics using *Drosophila* model system.

Zebrafish Lab Facility

The zebrafish lab facility was set up in October 2015, jointly by Biochemistry department and Zoology department in collaboration with CSIR-IGIB, Mathura Road, Delhi, and Sansriti Foundation Delhi. The facility is funded by Star Innovation projects DU, Star College project DBT, Govt. of India, and Innovation projects DU. It was developed with the aim of providing an alternative in vivo non-invasive model system for science education, teaching and research. The facility provides training in zebrafish model system to faculty and students. Till date about 50 faculty members and 500 students from various science streams from different Delhi University Colleges have participated in various workshops conducted by the zebrafish lab facility.

The state of the art temperature and photo-period controlled facility houses automated re-circulatory fish habitat system, RO water plant, stereo-microscopes, inverted microscope with digital display screen (Evos) and fluorescent microscope (Nikon). The facility have been hosting summer internship program for students (undergraduate and post graduate) to get hands on training and research experience. Zebrafish lab facility also serves as a resource center to provide zebrafish and embryos to other colleges/ departments and research institutes to support teaching and lab practicals.

RO Water

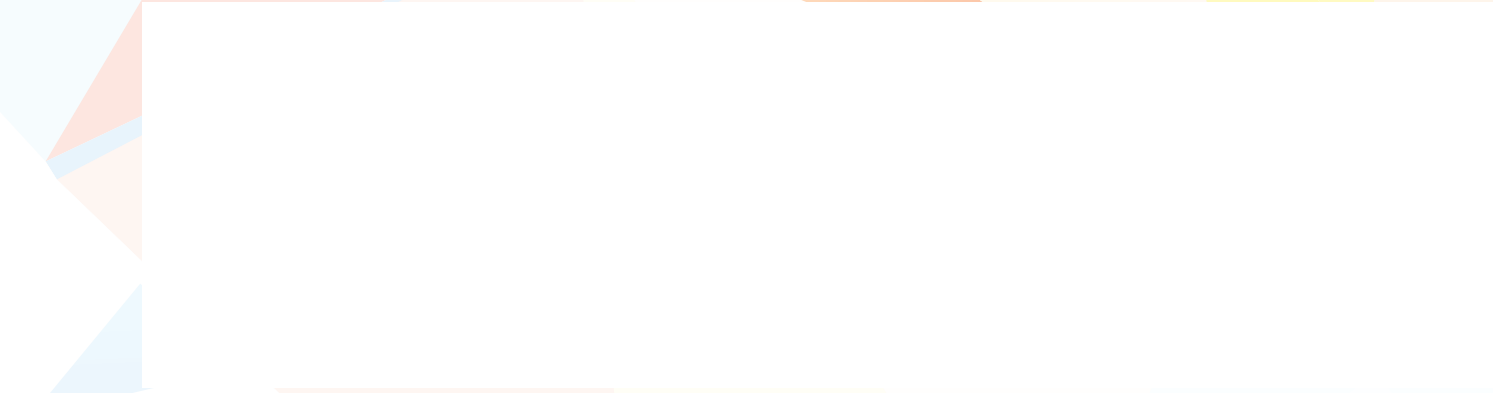
Cold and purified drinking water is supplied to the students through the RO system. Upgraded from bulky water coolers, the water is dispensed through seamless junction of taps located in a clean area dedicated for this purpose. Located on ground and first floors, the area is beautifully lit up by posters signifying the importance of water conservation.

Wi-Fi Connectivity

The College is fully Wi-Fi enabled. Keeping in mind the advanced technological demands of the students, the college provides this facility to all the students by sharing a secure password to be used within the college premises.

CCTV Surveillance

Closed-Circuit Television Units, 50 approx. in number, are strategically installed in the college and hostel premises to ensure that proper discipline is maintained. It is also useful for safety concerns of students.



Green Ride: (Last Mile Connectivity)

Introduced in 2017, it is a public bicycle sharing system which is one of the unique features of DRC. Promoting healthier lifestyle and everyday practices, this is an initiative which is environmental friendly. Students can hire bicycles for rides within the university campus. Once the ride is complete, the bicycles can be deposited at any of the five such centres located in North Campus. Please contact the centre for more details.

Sports Complex and Gymnasium

The college has a state-of-the-art gym complete with latest fitness equipment and machinery including treadmills, cross-body trainer, exercising bike, weight trainer etc. Promoting a healthy and active lifestyle, it caters to the students and staff who wish to avail the facility.

Recycling Unit

College aims to become zero discharge campus. Thus it has set up a recycling unit on campus which houses a paper recycling machines and leave shredder machine. This machines help to make recycled paper and leave shredder machine helps to make manure. The recycling unit is very popular in campus and manufactures tons of manure which is used in house or sold outside. The sale produce is used to meet expenses of recycling unit. The unit also prepares ceramic pots with medicinal/antipollution plants. These pots are used as mementos for various college functions. The recycling unit also recycles college waste paper to make white and brown recycled papers which are given to the arts society for painting and to department association for their use. Ceramic pots and paintings are being used as gifts for our guests in the college. Students do their internship here. The NSS students earn NSS hours by participating in green initiatives.

Relevant University Ordinances:

ORDINANCE XV-B

Maintenance of discipline among Students of the University

1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice - Chancellor.
2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he /she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - a. Physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and nonteaching staff of any Institution /Department and against any student within the University of Delhi
 - b. Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapons
 - c. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976
 - d. Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes
 - e. Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women
 - f. Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner
 - g. Willful destruction of institutional property
 - h. Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds
 - i. Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system;
 - j. Prohibition of Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
4. Without prejudice to the generality of his/her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his/her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or students -
 - a. be expelled; or
 - b. be, for a stated period rusticated; or
 - c. be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme or programmes of study in a College, Department or Institution of the University; or
 - d. be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
 - e. be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or that the result of the student or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he /she or they have appeared be cancelled.
5. Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself / herself with a copy of these rules. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he /she submits himself / herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction

of the Vice-Chancellor and several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed therein by the University.

ORDINANCE XV-C

Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging

1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College/Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students; and includes individual or collective acts or practices which
 - a. Involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force.
 - b. Violate the status, dignity and honour of women students.
 - c. Violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled caste and tribe.
 - d. Expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem.
 - e. Entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.
4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, or University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also suo motu enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/her decision shall be final.
9. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3(a), (b) and (c) the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
10. The Vice-chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
11. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of the University of Delhi are found guilty; under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diploma conferred by the University.
12. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.

13. All Institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instructions/directions issued under this Ordinance, and to give aid assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective implementation of the Ordinance.

Note: Order of the Vice-Chancellor in pursuance of Ordinance XV-C:

Where incident(s) of ragging are reported to the Vice-Chancellor by any authority under this Ordinance, the students(s) involved in ragging, shall be expelled for a specified term, designated in the order. Non-students involved in reports of ragging will be proceeded with under the criminal law of India; they will also be rendered ineligible for a period of five years from seeking enrolment in any of the institutions of the University of Delhi. Students against whom necessary action is taken under this note, will be given post decisional hearing, with strict adherence to the rules of natural justice.

ORDINANCE XV-D

The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (Ministry of Law and Justice)

An Act to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at workplace and for the prevention and redressal of complaints of sexual harassment and for matters connected there with incidental thereto.

WHEREAS sexual harassment results in violation of the fundamental rights of a woman to equality under articles 14 and 15 of the Constitution of India and her right to life and to live with dignity under article 21 of the Constitution and right to practice any profession or to carry on any occupation, trade or business which includes a right to a safe environment free from sexual harassment.

AND WHEREAS the protection against sexual harassment and the right to work with dignity are universally recognized human rights by international conventions and instruments such as Convention on the Elimination of all forms of discrimination against Women, which has been ratified on the 25th June, 1993 by the Government of India.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make provisions for giving effect to the said Convention for protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace. For details, please see the website <http://www.shebox.nic.in/assets/site/main/imges/Sexual/Harassment-at-Workplace-Act.pdf>

Cancellation of Admission & Refund of Fee:

Students who wish to withdraw their admission are required to fill the requisite proforma (available in the College Admin Office) counter-signed by the Admission convenor and Teacher-In-charge of the concerned department.

Cancellation of admission and refund of fee shall be in accordance with the norms followed by the University of Delhi.

Delhi University Rules For Refund of Fee on Account of Withdrawal/Cancellation of Admission

Reason for seeking refund	Quantum of fee to be refunded
When a student applies for withdrawal of admission upto last date of admission.	Full fee after deduction of Rs. 1000/- and full examination fee.
When an admission is made inadvertently due to error/ omission/ commission on the part of the University/College.	Full fee and full examination fee.
When cancellation of admission is due to concealment/ falsification of facts, submission of false/ fake certificate(s), providing misleading information by the student or for any error/ mistake on the part of the student.	No fee will be refunded.
When a student of Self Financing course applies for withdrawal of admission on or before the last date of admission.	Full fee after deduction of Rs. 1000/- and full examination fee.
In case a student after his/her admission expires within one month of the last date of admission.	Full fee including examination fee will be refunded to his/her parents

Note: An applicant can take admission only in one programme in one college at any given time. In case an admitted student wishes to withdraw/cancel the admission in any programme/college, she/he may cancel her/his admission online (cancellation fee will be charged as per the University Cancellation Policy), and approach the college to collect her/his certificates where the admission was taken. The applicant can proceed to take admission in another programme/college. Admission fee will be adjusted automatically and the applicant will need to pay only the balance, if the fee is more in the new college/programme in which the admission is being sought. In case the fee is less in the new college/programme, the balance would be refunded to the applicant's account as per the College/University rules after the admissions are closed.
